



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Editorial Note

In introducing this first edition of the Bandsmen's Year Book to the public, the Band Association of New South Wales is confident that it will be welcomed throughout Australia and New Zealand as a step—long overdue—in the right direction, i.e.—the proper recording of band activities in all States from the inception of contesting. When it is remembered that few Band Associations have kept their detailed competition records, it will be seen what a prodigious task fell to the committee entrusted with the compilation of this book in collecting the data required, and arranging it in an easy form of presentation.

Such a task could not have been accomplished without the full co-operation of the various Band Associations and Leagues throughout Australia and New Zealand, and those enthusiasts, who have made it a practice to keep notes in connection with contests and band activities generally.

An appeal was made through all States for every record of contests, and to all leading conductors, soloists, and devotees of the brass band, for any information that would help in the tabulating of the matter in these pages.

As will be gauged by our readers, the response was ready and thorough. Besides plain records, much matter came to light that would make very pleasant reading for bandsmen—intimate reminiscence and humourous anecdote—those hundred and one happenings in the band world that make its history no less than the contests mark its progress.

Unfortunately, through time and space limits, very little of this matter could be included in this volume. Perhaps arrangements will be made to allow of its inclusion in next year's publication.

It is only to be expected that some errors have crept into this first edition, and readers are invited to bring any such errors they notice to the attention of the compiling committee.

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THE BRASS BAND

Its Growth and Influence on the People

When requested to write a short "Foreword" to this very excellent "Historical Chronicle" of Australian Bands and their Conductors, I realised that the subject chosen for me, "The Brass Band and its influence upon the people," was rather a difficult one, in view of the fact that much of the detail so necessary had already been utilised to good purpose in the very thorough and efficient manner in which this book has been compiled and edited.

It was most certainly an inspiriation which created the thought, and led up to, a deci sion to collect material for the compilation of a treatise such as this, revealing, as it does, the history of Band affairs in Australia, from the the far distant past right up to the present day.

Memory carries me, as it will the readers of this book, away back over the years to those influences which have been deciding factors in the lives of so many of us who are Musicians, "influences created by the earliest recollection of music played by a Brass Band." Such influences have been, in very many instances, the foundations upon which expert musicianship has been created and eventually built up to a mighty edifice, standing as a perpetual monument to the effect and influence of Band music upon the people. Sir Arthur Sullivan, the son of a Bandmaster, John Phillip Sousa, Patrick Gillmore, Franz Lehar, once a Bandmaster, Dan, Fred, and Charles Godfrey, Owen, Rimmer, Gladney, and a mighty host of celebrities, not only in other countries, but also in this fair land of ours, bear witness to the powerful influences of Band music.

In drawing aside the veil behind which lies so much evidence of the influence of the Band upon the people, I feel almost lost in wonderment, and must quote the poet who wrote. "Stand where Moses stood and gaze the landscape o'er." What an honourable array of "Knights of the Brass" pass before me as I allow my mind to gaze o'er the landscape of the past. In the dim distance of the background I see Bands and Bandmasters whose efforts have been crowned with the splendid impressions indelibly stamped upon the minds of scores of thousands who were delighted and thrilled as a result of Brass Band music.

Through the misty haze of by-gone years there passes almost as a Phantom Brigade, the processions headed by the Bands of the Naval Brigade and the Naval Artillery with their Bandmasters, John Devlin and James Charlsworth. I can see the crowds, and. as a youngster, was one of the multitude influenced by those Bands as they paraded the streets of Sydney on Saturday afternoons.

The First and Second Garrison Artillery Bands, conducted by Hutchinson and Helm, were a delight to the people of Sydney. These Bands were reed and brass, military combinations, from the ranks of which came some very excellnt brass instrumentalists. Many readers will remember these Naval and Military Bands, and the excellent gentlemen in charge of their musical affairs. Hutchinson was Brigade Bandmaster and Chas. Helm was also Bandmaster of the N.S.W. Railway Band. As a youth, I was solo cornet with this Band, and, in this connection, first met Mr. George Burges, who was then a baritone player of note.

A whole volume could be written upon the subject of Sydney Bands, and I feel loth to pass on, leaving unwritten so much evidence of other fine Bands and excellent Bandmasters, who so wonderfully impressed people in those days.

Perhaps the pre-eminent recollection of outstanding soloist work with Bands is the playing of Her Von De Mehden. Throughout the decades from early youth I can still hear that beautiful, crystal-clear tone, the perfect phrasing, absolute control over a vast register, and the most wonderfully effective system of articulation, especially triple-tongueing. Surely a cornetist of peerless brilliance, with whom was associated Hugh McMahon, whose tone of "liquid gold," still resounds in the memory of thousands throughout this land. I believe these two fine players delighted the hearts and minds of more people than any other instrumentalists, without exception.

It was my privilege, as a youth, to travel Australia several times as a Bandmaster of touring Bands, thus being afforded an opportunity of meeting most of the prominent Bands and Bandmasters, and observing the effects of Band music upon the people of this country. I frequently meet people who become reminiscent of those days, and their conversation reveals how lasting are the impressions of good Band playing, such impressions seem never to die.

With great respect, I refer to the name of E. T. Code, father of Percy and Stanley, truly a worthy father of worthy sons. Code's Melbourne City Band was, in the early days,

a fine contesting combination. If I remember correctly, Percy—then very young—played soprano. Some very fine players were connected with this Band, and assisted in making history in the State of Victoria. Their great influence swayed crowds of listeners when this Band played, and the Conductor left "Footprints on the sands of time," and a memory cherished by all who knew him.

Tasmania gave evidence of the influence made upon the people, and great was the excitement in Launceston when the St. Josephs and the Launceston City Bands rendered programmes at that wonderful spot, "The Gorge," or paraded through the streets of Launceston, under the direction of their Bandmasters, the Lithgow brothers. Hobart (should I have referred to it first?) had its Garrison Band, with that remarkable character and capable Bandmaster, Tommy Hopkins. It was here I first met Charley Smith, then a youth, who afterwards became a cornetist who could make his cornet sing like a nightingale, and was Bandmaster of the Melbourne Fire Brigade and Vice-Regal Bands.

It seems somewhat difficult to stick to my text, but nevertheless, these reminiscences are all in connection with the influences of Brass Bands on the public. I feel that I have only started on a subject which is colossal, so how is it possible for any one person within limited space to adequately convey to readers how the Brass Band has, and does, influence the people.

Adelaide Loco. Band, conducted by Charley Allison, delighted thousands of people who flocked to hear their programmes in and around Adelaide. Some fine Bandsmen and Bandmasters have come from South Australia.

Western Australia, with its Perth City Band, then in its infancy, was the possessor of some particularly fine Bands, the Eastern Goldfields swarmed with a hive of Brass Bandites. Boulder City, A.W.A., and Kalgoolie Bands were all famous, with their Bandmasters Hugh McMahon, Bill Partington and Tony Grieve. How they all loved each other! Isn't it remarkable, the old spirit never dies, nor even fades away. Could anyone ever estimate the influence of these Bands upon the scores of thousands of people in Western Australia. I observed enormous crowds away on these Eastern Goldfields, and in the Perth Gardens. How those people must have been impressed by the Brass Band.

Percy Jones, then a youth, conducted the St. Augustines Boys' Band. This was one of the finest Juvenile Bands in Australia. J. Ord Hume stated that it was the best boys' Band in the world, and repeated this statement many years later, when on a visit to Australia. This Band produced many fine players, who are to be found to-day both in amateur Bands and professional orchestras throughout the country.

Bands surely impressed the people of Geelong, the home of the St. Augustine Boys' and later the Harbour Trust Band, with Harry Shugg as Bandmaster. John Brownlee, one of the world's best baritone singers, was a Bandsman here. Percy Jones' son went to Italy to study the highest form of ecclesiastical music, and Captain Harry Shugg, of Malvern Tramways Band and Victorian Defence Bands, are points of evidence in the case for Bands making impressions upon the people at this place.

Newcastle City Band, with William Barkell, made history for that Citv in those days. This fine Band was for years, perhaps, the greatest in Australia. Peter Healey was solo cornet, and there are thousands to-day who remember "Sweet Spirit Hear My Prayer" as played by Peter.

Undoubtedly the greatest event in the history of Bands in Australia was the first visit of the Besses o' th' Barn Band, under the conductorship of Alex. Owen. This Band was a revelation to our Bandsmen and Bandmasters. Their visit was crowned with such success that many thousands of pounds profit resulted, probably more than made before or since by any visiting instrumentalists. How vast was the impression created? Who can tell, but this fact stands as a living monument, a powerful firm of entrepreneurs was created, based upon the profits made by the success of this Band's influence upon the people.

The outstanding feature of this Band was it's perfect ensemble, flawless tonal blend, dead-true tuning, and the admirable artistry of Lawson, trombonist; Haigh, soprano; Moore and Hallam, solo cornetists. Our own Mr. Kerry, now of Randwick Band, came with the Besses on the second visit, and had the reputation of being the greatest euphoniumist in the world. Both Melba and Clara Butt predicted the success of Besses first visit to Australia, and these great artists had certainly been impressed by the influence of this great Brass Band.

I definitely state that our Brass Bands have been greatly influenced by Besses, for they set a standard of perfection not attained by the subsequent Bands to visit us, such as Sousa's, with the splendid cornet virtuosos, Herbert Clark, the Royal Marines from Chatham, Artillery from Newcastle on Tyne, and the Canadian Kilties. Some of these Bands were very fine, but for some reason did not impress either the general public or the Bandsmen as did the Besses o' th' Barn.

In many respects, from this period on, our Bands greatly improved, and became superior musical bodies, capable of presenting to the public very fine programmes. Such splendid Bands as Rozelle, Collingwood, Malvern Tramways, conducted by Partington, Johnstone, and Shugg, also many other Bands and Conductors, made wonderful impression upon their audiences. The Commonwealth and Newcastle Steel Works Band were indeed Bands of a very high standard, conducted by Bert. Baile. One of these Bands (Steelworks) met and defeated some of the best English Bands at Halifax and Crystal Palace, a record yet to be equalled by any other Australian Band; nevertheless, I am convinced that it is quite possible to be repeated and even surpassed.

My comments to this point have concerned, shall I say, the middle period Bands. To them were given exceptional opportunities of making a mark upon the people and impressing them when present-day opposition did not exist. Some of these Bands now exist in name only, others have stood the test of time (and other things), and now belong to the present period.

These Bands of the present period throughout Australia have a somewhat difficult task to perform in impressing the people in a manner favourably comparable with the Bands of the days of yore. The world's finest vocalists, instrumentalists, symphonic orchestras, and Bands, are practically in the homes of every Australian. Constant "listening-in" naturally educates the people, thereby creating a high-grade "musical sense," which becomes severely critical when applied to performances of Bands and orchestras which are local. The psychology of the peoples' minds debates whether it is more pleasing and interesting to remain at home listening-in to celebrated vocalists, orchestras and Bands, or go to the local Band performance. This is the great difficulty confronting the Bands of to-day. It is pleasant and edifying to ponder over the Bands of the past periods, but it is the present and the future we must be concerned with.

I am of the opinion that Bands still can and will hold the crowds, but I am also persuaded that the necessity is greater than ever for building up higher-class standards to meet and comply with the keener "music sense" demands of the public. America has more jazz music and a greater number of "listeners-in" than any other country, yet records now before me prove that Bands are more numerous and in popular favour to a greater extent than ever. Hundreds of school Bands exist at the present time in America, and some of them number up to one hundred and twenty performers. America is definitely Band-minded, and Australia can become the same. Municipalities, concert promoters and sports' committees who serve up "canned music" at their functions are void of the sense of culture and refinement. Amplification of recorded music has been and is responsible for more musical distortion and vulgarity than honest musical minds ever conceived as being possible.

The present period is one of enthusiasm and concentration. Higher standards have been brought before the people which naturally call for more "classy" service. Bands must of necessity rise to the occasion as never before in the endeavour to impress the people.

I feel the necessity to urge my brother musicians of the Band world to be enthusiastic, to concentrate and to discuss one with the other, wavs and means of meeting present-day demands of the people we must impress. The Brass Band is a noble and beautiful instrument, capable of demonstrating wonderful effects. It can rise to the loftiest pinnacle, represent the grand organ, portray choral music, and give effect to much high-grade music as perhaps no other body of instrumentalists can.

The cultured Alberto Goldman, of American fame, recently journeyed to Canada to hear a visiting English Brass Band and confessed himself astonished by the fine quality and expert musicianship of this Band. Henri Verbruggen adjudicated at Ballarat Band Contest, and was remarkably impressed with the Bands, and was not slow to bestow great praise where deserved, especially commending some Bands for the precise attack, release and tonal effects manifest in their playing. Surely none would deny that the Brass Band has impressed, not only the ordinary citizen, but also the cultured musician?

No fair-minded reader would pardon me if I concluded this essay without making some reference to the Bands of the Salvation Army. In the capital cities of Australia, in fact throughout the whole wide world, these "comrades and brother Knights of the Brass" delight and interest hundreds of thousands of people. Some splendid types of Bandsmen have become shining stars in the "realms of Brass Bandom," who owe lasting gratitude to Salvation Army Bands. A whole tome would not afford me any too great space to ennumerate the evidence I could give of influence of these Brass Bands upon the people.

I trust this "foreword" will serve the purpose of introducing to you such an excellent treatise as this "History of Bands in Australia." Such a vast field presented itself to me that I have only touched on the subject, and I trust that the multitude of excellent Bands and Bandmasters not mentioned will understand and join in the effort to so improve our Bands that the programmes presented and the standard of rendition will continue to impress the people even more than in the past, and so elevate our Bands to a greater degree of excellence than ever.

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BANDS IN NEW SOUTH WALES

Spasmodic and isolated attempts to foster Band Contests were made in the '80's and early '90's of the last century, but the first definite attempt to put them on a sound footing and to carry out Contests with some semblance of order arose out of a meeting convened by Mr. C. Foret, proprietor of the "Intercolonial Band News," and held at Wollongong on 1st January, 1896, at which centre a Band Contest, won by the Fourth Regiment Band of Newcastle, conducted by Mr. W. Barkel, had just concluded.

At that meeting an ambitious scheme was launched to promote an Inter-Colonial Band Contest on a much greater scale than previously dreamt of. Somewhat earlier, to be exact on November 24th, 1895, the Band Association of N.S.W. had been inaugurated as a result of a meeting held in Sydney and convened by Mr. W. G. Cook, Secretary of Redfern Borough Band. Many difficulties, some of which now read very strangely, were encountered when a set of rules for control of bands and for contesting were under consideration. In those days dance music at most of the Harbour picnics was supplied by brass bands of eight performers, and at one of the early meetings of the newly-formed Band Association the Secretary of a then prominent Sydney Band expressed astonishment that the minimum number of members to compete with a Band in a Contest should be fixed at sixteen. He was very definite in his views that if a Band was not able to play with a team of eight men it could not be called a Band at all.

However, the various conflicting opinions were reconciled, a set of rules agreed upon, officials elected and the Band Association of N.S.W. set upon its feet, where it has remained firmly fixed ever since. The original Executive Committee consisted of Messrs. R. Albury (Parramatta Model Band); S. A. Bibb (Glebe Borough); G. Gates (Premier); J. F. McCrory (Young Australia); C. A. Burton (Newtown); G. Burges (Cadet); F. Witton (Balmain Premier Coldstream); J. Moore (Enfield); and H. Peacock (Redfern Borough).

As a result of the formation of the Band Association and the meeting held at Wollongong, events moved quickly and a Committee was formed to implement the proposed contest, consisting of Messrs. J. H. Thompson, President; J. Palmer, Secretary; T. Mellor, Treasurer; G. Burges, Assistant Secretary; C. Helm, R. Chamberlain, R. Albury, G. Gates, W. Love, S. Bibb, F. Witton, W. Norris, W. Armstrong and H. Weaver.

The N.S.W. Government granted a subsidy of £250 to the Fund and the Contest, which was carried out at the Exhibition Building, Sydney, on November 7th and 9th, 1896, brought together Bands from N.S.W., Tasmania and Queensland, there being nine competing Bands in A Grade and ten in B Grade. The Judges were Signor R. Hazon and Mr. T. P. Shaw, of Sydney, and Mr. W. T. Bates, of Hobart. The A Grade contest was won by Newtown Band and the B Grade by Zeehan Military Band, from Tasmania. This Contest may be fairly claimed as the first important Band Contest held in Australia at which there was any definite form of Rules or system of control under which Bands knew what they could or could not do.

Victoria soon after entered the Contest field, and at Easter, 1897, the Druids' Friendly Society promoted a Contest which attracted Bands from N.S.W., Tasmania and New Zealand. At this contest all Bands competed in the one grade, and it is worthy of note that it was not until 1905 that any system of grading was introduced into Victorian Contests. The Melbourne Contest of 1897 attracted 11 competitors and was won by N.S.W. Railway Military Band, second and third places being also filled by N.S.W. Bands in Newtown and Glebe Borough. The Victorian Band Association, with headquarters at Ballarat, was formed in 1901 and from that date exercised its influence in the control of Contests in a similar manner to that of the N.S.W. Association, with which it became affiliated.

After two years in Melbourne and commencing with 1900, Ballarat became the centre of Victoria's contesting activities and the Championship Contest was held annually in that City until 1915, when there was a break until 1919. The revival lasted until 1922, when evil days fell upon Ballarat, and the Championship Contest was abandoned.

The Victorian Association faded out of existence in 1932, being superseded by the Victorian Bands' League with headquarters in Melbourne. The formation of the League was responsible for a temporary revival of Ballarat prestige in 1932, and Championship Contests were carried out from 1932 to 1934, when they again lapsed.

During the years when Ballarat ceased to function, occasional Championship Contests were held in Melbourne, but nothing of a continuous nature has been attempted.

At Christmas, 1898, Tasmania, which in those days had several important bands, including St. Josephs of Launceston (founded in 1845), came into line with a Contest on an Inter-Colonial scale held at Launceston. Bands from N.S.W. and Victoria attended and Code's Melbourne City Band carried off the first prize. Unfortunately, Tasmania has not progressed like the other States, and no Contest comparable with that of 1898 has ever since been attempted in the island State. It is worth mentioning that at the Launceston Contest the N.S.W. Railway Military Band competed as the official representatives of N.S.W., having been selected for that honour by the combined N.S.W. Bands, and part of its expenses were defrayed by contributions from other Bands. They were not successful, however, and an unknown country band from N.S.W. McMahon's Hillgrove Band, actually filled a higher position in the prize list. This Band contained seven McMahon brothers, one of whom was the Conductor. The family subsequently migrated to the Western Australian Goldfields and by their outstanding ability lifted Boulder City Band of W.A. to a position where it challenged the very best bands that Australia could produce.

It was not for many years afterwards that the other States conducted Band Contests with anything more than a local appeal. Queensland's first attempt at a Championship Contest that attracted Inter-State Competition was at Brisbane in 1914, the successful Band being Rozelle District Band from N.S.W. Annual Championship Contests were continued thereafter. The system adopted in Queensland differs from other States in that the Championship Contest is held in a different centre in each year. The Contest is held in one of the principal towns in the State and the venue has extended over the area from Brisbane and Toowoomba in the South to Townsville in the Far North. Except that the 1931 Contest was abandoned altogether and that the A Grade Championship Contest lapsed in 1934, there has been no break since in the continuity in Queensland, culminating in the State's greatest effort in its Coronation Cham pionship Band Contest at Brisbane in 1937.

In recent years South Australia has carried out its Championship Contest regularly at Tanunda, while Western Australia, owing to its isolated position and sparse population, has only been able to hold Championship Contests occasionally. In 1931 Bondi Beach Band from N.S.W. won the W.A. Championship at Perth.

On two occasions N.S.W. Bands have competed for the Championship of New Zealand and were successful on both occasions, Newcastle City being the winners in 1906 and South Sydney (now known as Bondi Beach Band) in 1923.

Band Associations were formed in the various States, and in February, 1915, a Conference was held in Melbourne at which an attempt was made to arrive at a set of contesting rules suitable for the whole Commonwealth. At that time there were several very important differences in the views of the different Associations as to the proper methods of Band Contesting. At the Conference N.S.W. was represented by Messrs. G. Burges and W. H. O'Donnell; Victoria by Messrs. S. Jamieson and G. Walker; and Queensland by Mr. C. T. Eade.

An attempt was made to set up a supreme Band Contest Governing Body for the whole of Australia, but the different views could not be reconciled and, although subsequent conferences were held in 1920 and 1921, no satisfactory settlement was arrived at. It remained for the Sydney Conference of 1934 to bring into being a universal set of contesting rules and to establish the Australian Band Council, which is now the supreme Band contesting authority in the Commonwealth. The representatives at the Sydney Conference were Messrs. G. Burges (N.S.W.), H. J. Sullivan (Victoria), W. J. Caught (Queensland) and H. G. Dall (South Australia).

Except for a Championship Contest in 1902, there was a temporary lull in N.S.W. from 1898 to 1904, but a definite revival took place in 1905, and in only two years since (1907 and 1917) has Sydney failed to carry out its Championship Band Contest.

Throughout all kinds of trials and tribulations Sydney's annual Championship Contest has been a feature of the Band life of Australia, and except in the two years previously mentioned the Championship Contest has been held with unbroken regularity since 1905. Wars, droughts, depressions and shortage of money have never broken the contesting spirit of the N.S.W. Bands and, whether prize money has been large or small, has made little difference in the number of bands that competed.

A few incidents out of the ordinary may be of interest.

For the 1906 Contest, twelve Sydney Bands handed over to the Contest Fund $\pounds 300$, being their total earnings from City Council Park programmes, and that Contest was carried out in Hyde Park free to the public.

For the 1916 Contest the Band Association of N.S.W. found itself without any money and the possibility of the Championship Contest being abandoned was contemplated. Better counsels prevailed, however, and it was decided to offer the Bands a contest on the best terms that could be managed. Total cash prizes of $\pm 50/10/$ - were announced for the three Grades, the first prize in the Championship being ± 10 . No less than fifteen Bands competed.

A total of $\pounds73$ cash prizes was announced in 1918 and 1919 and in 1918 twenty-two Bands competed, while in 1919 the number grew to twenty-eight, including eight in the A Grade Championship, for which the advertised first prize was $\pounds20$ cash.

Never in its history has Sydney ever had to cancel a Championship Contest once it was decided upon.

In 1935, for the purpose of placing the Annual Championship Contest on a sounder financial footing, the Band Association of N.S.W. joined forces with the Citizens of Sydney Organising Committee and, commencing with 1936, the Band Council of Control, consisting of representatives from the Citizens of Sydney Organising Committee and the Band Association of N.S.W., with Sir Samuel Walder as Chairman, has managed the Championship Contests.

It is confidently expected that the Australian Championship Contest for 1938, carried out in conection with Australia's 150th Anniversary Celebrations, will eclipse anything previously attempted in the Southern Hemisphere. RESULTS OF "A" GRADE CONTESTS HELD IN NEW SOUTH WALES.

BANDS IN VICTORIA



Although geographically one of the smallest States, Victoria cannot be regarded similarly in a musical sense. Melbourne is the Capital, and for many years has been looked upon as a cultural centre of the Commonwealth. Some of the finest Bands Australia has produced have originated in this city. Bands such as the Malvern Tramways Band, winner of the Australian Championship last year; Metropolitan Fire Brigade Band, winner of the Australian title at Adelaide, in 1936; and Hawthorn City Band, winner of the Victorian and Melbourne Centenary Championships, in 1934-1935, are only a few of many excellent Bands which have brought credit and distinction to the State.

From a contest point of view, Victoria was for years the mecca of Australian Bands. The South Street Society, promoters of the famous Ballarat Contests, have done much to bring renown to the State. Bands from all States of the Commonwealth and from distant New Zealand have competed in these memorable contests.

Prior to 1931, the governing body of Bands in this State was the Victorian Band Association, with headquarters at Ballarat. After being in existence for over thirty years, the Association was superseded by the Victorian Bands' League, which was inaugurated in Melbourne on April 10th, 1931. For many years a good deal of dissatisfaction had prevailed among Bands in Victoria, and many were in favour of a new organisation being established, as it was considered that the headquarters of the governing body should be located in the capital city of the State. To bring this about, however, was another matter, and, after many fruitless attempts had been made to form a new organisation, the project was given up as hopeless. A lack of complete unanimity among the Bands and the disinclination on the part of the various State governing bodies to recognise any new movement, always left the Victorian Band Association in command of the situation. It was left to a newcomer to the Band world (Mr. H. J. Sullivan) to take over the task of making the transfer. Despite intense opposition from the old Association and several of the State Associations, he persevered with his attempt, and eventually consummated the establishment of the Victorian Bands' League, with headquarters at Melbourne, which ever since has been the controlling body in Victoria.

The advent of the new League acted as a stimulant, and before long almost every Band of note in the State came under its influence. Particular attention was paid to contesting, and this brought about a steady improvement in the Bands. In Melbourne, massed bands' recitals were arranged, and the one held in 1931 to mark the inauguration of the League, took place at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, before an audience of 20,000 people. Never previously had Bands played to such a vast audience, and the occasion clearly showed that public support was obtainable to any function properly organised and conducted. These displays enable the Bands to enjoy added status, and this gives them greater recognition from the public.

Mr. E. T. Code was in every sense of the word a pioneer in raising the standard of Brass Band Music in Australia. He formed the Band in 1892. Mr. Code gathered around him a body of enthusiasts, and, by his outstanding ability as a Musician and a teacher, he had, in a few years, welded them into something different from Brass Bands of the period. He departed from the previous standard of a few brilliant performers and the rest of the Band mediocre, and worked on the lines of a combination, which, by constant practice together and mutual goodwill, would give quite different results, all parts being equally proficient.


The Band first competed at Castlemaine in 1894, getting second prize. In 1897 was unsuccessful in the first Druids Contest. Bands from every State, and the "Invercargill Garrison Band" (first New Zealand Band to visit Australia) competed. The following year, 1898, the Druids Society donated a Challenge Shield for the Championship of Australia (to be won 3 times in succession before becoming the property of the winner). Besson and Co., a London firm also donated a \pounds 50 Challenge Shield. Both these trophies were won outright by the Band, who were successful in the years 1898, 1899, and 1900.

Between times, "Code's" visited Launceston in 1898, maintaining their title of Champions of Australia, defeating the "Hillgrove" (N.S.W.) Band. In November, 1899, they visited Bathurst, N.S.W., but this time were placed second to the "Hillgrove" Band. They won the Bendigo Contest in January, 1898. The band competed at Ballarat from 1901 to 1904, with varying success.

The advent of moving pictures depleted the ranks, many members accepting engagements at the theatres, when Band accompaniments were the order of the day.

With the death of Mr. Code, in 1918, at the age of 54, the Band went out of existence.

A re-union of Old Members was held in Melbourne in 1934. There were 40 of the Old Players present. They came from all parts of Australia, and one old player came all the way from America to be present. Thus exits—One of Australia's leading Brass Bands: "CODE'S."





When the band has been called to attention at point A, they will cover, dress, and prepare to move off by command of "quick march" from the officer in charge, playing the Quickstep, and march to point E. On arriving at point E, the Band will counter-march from front to rear and flank to flank, then right turn and march to point C. On arriving at point C the Band will left turn and counter-march from flank to flank, then left turn, advance three paces, and counter-march from front to rear, continue marching to point E, then counter-march from front to rear, march to point D, right turn, march to point FF, then counter-march from flank to flank to point F, right turn, march to point G, left wheel, march to point H, halt, and continue playing Quickstep to end of strain.

The Band will be judged from the command "attention" at point A, and judging will continue till the command "stand at ease" at point H.

Bands halting before or marching past point H will be penalised one point for each pace. "Band" means front rank.

Counter-marching between points D and E must be done inside the letters or flags.

Note.—During the counter-march at point C the Drum-Major and drummers will mark time, taking a pace forward to correct their intervals. During the flank to flank counter-march at point FF the Drum-Major and drummers will left turn and mark time, moving off with Band on signal "forward."

GEORGE BURGES — an Outstanding Band Official.

At the age of 14 years George Burges commenced playing in a cadet band, and in 1895, whilst still in his early 'teens, he was appointed to the first executive committee of the Band Association of N.S.W., where he remained until 1900, and was Assistant Secretary of the 1896 and 1897 contests. Auditor in 1902, he was again appointed to the executive committee in 1903, and has worked on that committee ever since; in 1905 he was vice-president; in 1906 he was appointed to the position of Honorary Secretary of the Association, one that he has occupied for the past 31 years, without a break. What a magnificent record!—over 40 years of honorary service to the Bandsmen of N.S.W. During all this time he has borne the burdens and worries of the Association on his broad shoulders, and is still at the helm, where we hope he will remain for many years to come, for, despite his long experience, he is still full of youthful enthusiasm, and his capacity for hard work is undiminished.

It is impossible to compute the monetary value of his services to our bands, but the Band Association of N.S.W has decided to tender him a Testimonial Dinner during the 1938 Contest period—January 29th, to be precise—and to present him with a memento of appreciation and regard. It is anticipated that most of the prominent adjudicators, conductors and band officials in Australia present in Sydney at that time will attend, and the function should be one of the most brilliant of the celebration period.

In order to show their appreciation of Mr. Burges' work for music, and in accordance with their usual policy during their long and honourable association with the Band Association of N.S.W., Messrs. W. H. Paling & Co. Ltd. have asked if they might have the honour of inviting every bandmaster present in Sydney at that time to be their guests at this function.

FIRST BRASS BAND CONTEST IN NEW ZEALAND.

The International Exhibition, held in Hagley Park, Christchurch, in 1882, introduced the first brass band contest held in New Zealand. There were five competitors, and the band of the C Battery of Artillery, Timaru (now the Municipal Band) were the winners. Rules governing the contest were somewhat elastic, there being no restriction as to number of players, the Timaru Band putting on seventeen performers, whilst the band of the C.Y.C., Christchurch, had over thirty. Bass and side drums were allowed, and there was no question as to the bona fide of any player in regard to his active association with a band for any stated period. Mr. Jas. Rowles was the conductor, and Mr. T. Perry, solo cornet. The test selection was "Own Choice," and Timaru's choice was "Notre Chere Alsace," a piece which became very popular. After the judge's decision was announced there was a call for more music from the winning band, and Timaru responded with a selection from "Patience." It happened that at this time Williamson's Company was singing the opera in New Zealand, and the band was served with a writ, prohibiting it from again playing "Patience." Two members of the band are still living.



Brief Record of Mr. Baile's Career.

Mr. Baile was the distinguished conductor of the Australian Newcastle Steel Works Champion Band, which toured the world in 1924 and was successful in winning the Belle Vue Champion Contest at Manchester, where twenty-two of Great Britain's leading Bands competed. He also gained first prize at the Halifax Contest against sixteen British Bands, and was awarded third prize in the Crystal Palace Championship in the same year.

Mr. Baile's musical career commenced at the age of nine years, when he was taught wood-wind by the late Mr. George Campbell, a celebrated graduate of the famous Kneller Hall. He became an accomplished player of the flute, piccolo and clarinet, and played these instruments for some years. About 1900 he took up the study of brass instruments, and was recognised as one

of the leading cornetists of the day. In 1913 he was appointed conductor of the Perth City Band, which appointment he held until 1920. During that period he won several championships in "A" Grade won several championships in A Grade in Western Australia. In 1920 he was ap-pointed conductor of the Newcastle Steel Works Band (N.S.W.), with which he won the Championsh'p of Queensland in the year 1922. In 1921 his band was runner-up for the Championship of Australasia at South Street. In 1924, as previously men-tioned, the Newcastle Steel Works Band toured the world and accepted an engagement from the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. The success was immediate,

He has also had extensive orchestral experience, both as player and conductor, was conductor of the Perth Operatic Society during his residence in that city, and conductor of the Newcastle Operatic Society while associated with the Steel Works Band. Mr. Baile adjudicated at the Ballarat Championship Contests, 1932 and 1933; New Zealand Championships, 1935 and 1936; and Queensland, 1936. At present he is conductor of the Bondi Beach Concert Band and Director of Music to the Waverley Municipal Council. Mr. Baile was appointed Musical Director of the City of Sydney Festival Band of 100 performers, which gave its first performance on the occasion of the visit of H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester to Sydney. The Festival Band is composed of the finest musicians of the Band


A PROMINENT QUEENSLAND CONDUCTOR.

Mr. Sam Whitaker, conductor of the Maryborough Federal Band, has a long and creditable record of 53 years' active service in banding. He began his career very early by playing the cymbals in the newly-formed Wide Bay Regimental Band, and under Conductor Alf Hall's tuition played side-drum, horn, baritone, trombone, solo cornet, and finally soprano in that band during its hey-day of fame. He also had considerable orchestral experience at the time.

When the Naval Brigade Band was formed, Mr. Whitaker accepted the position as band-master, in due course winning the "B" Grade and "A" Grade Championship of Queensland. After a few years he handed this splendid combination to Mr. W. Ryder, and proceeded to fashion the Junior Naval Band from a team of young beginners. This later became the Maryborough Federal Band, which Mr. Whitaker has conducted for the whole of its life of 16 years. His skill is reflected in the consistently high standard of his band, in the modern original brass band compositions featured, and in the high standard of playing in the "B" "A' and Grade competitions.

He is a champion for the cause of local and amateur players versus imported and professional players. Every member of his band is a local man, nearly all of them being trained by him right from the initial stages. Many members have been in the band since its inception.

Even the briefest account of Mr. Whitaker would be incomplete without a reference to the keen personal interest he takes in the bandsmen. This influence has welded band and committee into an unusually harmonious and brotherly social unit.







A "DINKUM" QUEENSLAND COUNTRY TOWN BAND.

The present Stanthorp Town Band was formed in June, 1929, under the leadership of its present bandmaster, Mr. P. Ryan, with Mr. C. S. Mathison as secretary. The following year Mr. J. B. Ferris, Chairman of the Shire Council was elected president. The combination competed at Maryborough in 1932, and in a field of eleven bands succeeded in winning the Oval and Street Marches, Country Grade, fourth in Test Selection, fifth in Hymn Tune, and fourth in the Open Handicap Waltz. The following year the players journeyed to Mackay, winning the Hymn Tune in the Country Grade. Mr. Jas. Mackelvie, a well-known Brisbane bandmaster and adjudicator, was brought from Brisbane in 1932 and ccached the band for Maryborough.—(C. S. Mathison.)

BANDS IN QUEENSLAND

By J. R. FOSTER.

Secretary, Queensland Band Association.

In the small space allotted it is only possible to give the barest brief outline of the progress of banding in Queensland, but this State can be justly proud of its achievements in firmly establishing and maintaining bands as one of the essential public entertainments and utilities in the community.

Over fifty years ago, when the bands in the Old Country were busily forming their first "National Association of Amateur Bands" as it was then called, and, after British bands had been regularly contesting for over thirty years, the band movement in Queensland Colony (as it was then called) had scarcely taken root.

Band contesting in Queensland was then practically unknown, and as a matter of fact one of the earliest records of an Australian Band Contest (apart from purely local contests or competitions) was at Creswick in Victoria in December, 1884. The first Band Contest in Queensland was held in the Botanic Gardens, Brisbane, in August, 1877, and for that contest the Gympie Oddfellows' Band travelled to Brisbane to meet the goliaths of the metropolis. That the other competitors withdrew was no fault of the Gympieites, and their effort was certainly meritorious, when it is taken into account that the band had to travel by any horse vehicle available to Tewantin and then proceed to Brisbane by water per the old S.S. Noosa.

Those were the days when the Hallelujah Chorus was reckoned to be the piece de resistance; when bombardons encircled shoulders and the valve trombone held sway. As a matter of fact bands were prejudged by their ability to make a big noise, and the drummer was the big half of the ensemble.

It was about twenty years after its very first contest that Queensland began to hold fairiy regular annual band competitions, and even then contests were lucky to get five or more bands to grace the town with their presence. New Zealand was well advanced in contesting before this time, and contesting flourished in both North and South Islands in the 'eighties.

As in most of the other Australian Colonies, the band movement proper seriously began with the Military and Defence forces. In the latter part of the last century Queensland possessed several bands which were supported in this way, and notable amongst these was the "Headquarters Band" of Brisbane, as it was then known. This was a full military (brass and reed) combination, modelled on the same lines as the Military Bands of the Mother Country. According to the accounts of the old-timers, it was a fine band indeed, and its concerts were most popular in the city. Records are still extant of this old band and some are held by Harry Gubbins, who still plays solo cornet for the Sandgate Band, and Harry Daniel, who is still actively connected with the band world and is a district vice-president of the Queensland Band Association.

In addition, there was a fine band attached to the Artillery and also to the Navy, but, apart from these bands, little was known of band work in the metropolis between 1880 and 1890.

Towards the latter end of the 'nineties an impetus was given to the study of the cornet, and band instruments generally, by the arrival from England of a very fine performer, in the person of the late Mr. George Bloomfield. In his charge the band of the local Naval Brigade made the trip to Melbourne in connection with the inauguration of the Commonwealth celebrations.

tions. From this time private bands began to spring up here and there in the city and in the country towns, and the idea of organising band competitions may be said to have taken place at the commencement of the new century. Notable amongst the enthusiasts in these days were Mr. J. Hendry Grice, of Brisbane, and Messrs. Percival and Snell, of Gympie, and Mr. Alf. Hall, of Maryborough. To these gentlemen and others like them must go the credit of commencing the contesting idea which was to sweep the whole country and cause the general public to look forward to yearly band competitions.

Mr. Grice formed the Brisbane Municipal Concert Band which is still in existence, and the bands commenced by Messrs. Hall and Percival are amongst the oldest in the State. Bands which were to win laurels for their conductors and credit to their cities.

Regular band competitions were first made possible by the formation of the Austral Society in Toowoomba. The first annual event of this society was held about 1903 and included general musical and choral items, culminating in a band contest. The society kept going for perhaps eight or ten years and, through its annual band contests, did a great deal in the advancement of bands and band music in this State. These old contests were splendidly patronised and provided good music and fine marching events.

During the course of one of the Austral Society's contests in the year 1906, a meeting of bands was called with the idea of forming an Association to govern contests and look after the interests of bands generally. The result was the birth of the present Queensland Band Association.

The Association soon became a well-developed child and began to take a major part in the promotion and control of Queensland Band Contests and, on the decline of the Austral Society, the Association took over the responsibility of arranging for annual contests to be held At the various centres throughout the State. These contests, as records will show, have proceeded through the years practically without interruption with marked success. As the contests improved in organisation, so the number of bands in the State increased, until it soon became necessary to establish a system of grading of bands, which system is still in operation.

Solo competitions have been for many years past an essential part of band contests in this State, enabling individual players to become expert on their own particular instrument and in common with band events there has been a process of evolution in solo and party playing as year succeeds year. The practice of including solo contests is of material advantage to bands, and the appearance of soloists as artists on the contest stage gives that encouragement to players which enables them to overcome nervousness when they compete with the band on the contest platform.

Competitions have been provided for the past twenty years for all the main instruments in the band, and even the drummers are given opportunity to show their skill and technique on their instruments.

In passing, it is interesting to note the revolution in the style and quality of music now played at our contests—whereas the old-timers were satisfied with simple pieces, the bands of to-day delight their patrons with tone-perfect renditions of the most difficult and classical masterpieces. Of recent years much attention has been given to the correct interpretation of the great composers, and bands have vied with each other in securing the services of the best band trainers available to bring their performances to near perfection as possible.

Queensland can boast many notable personalities in the band world, amongst the old school being that great composer and band arranger, Chas. Trussell, who still enjoys the quietude of his sylvan home at Mount Bauple, who gave us many notable arrangements for our contests. Mr. Trussell has, apart from his lifelong work as a band trainer and adjudicator, arranged hundreds of selections, marches and waltzes for bands. Then we still have with us Mr. Albert Wade, who has judged contests at Ballarat, Sydney and New Zealand; Mr. Wm. Ryder, senior, late of the Besses Band, wno made fame here as a cornetist, trainer and judge; Mr. Lou Gray, who has given his whole career to music and is perhaps one of the best trainers in the Commonwealth; Mr. E. Jackson, who is known throughout the Southern Hemisphere as an adjudicator and arranger. Of the older school Messrs. W. H. Davis, S. Whitaker, Jack Denovan, Albert Kaeser, Harold Perkins, Jimmy Clark, Horace Harper, Bill Burgemeister, Arthur Peek, Jim Napier, S. Ryan, Reg. Dearlove, Jacky Brennan, Jock Henry are all still on deck and actively connected as bandmasters with the principal bands of the State.

This State is particularly fortunate in having a large number of young bandmasters who have made a name throughout the Commonwealth with their fine methods of band training. Amongst these are Jim Compton, the versatile conductor of the Cairns Citizens Band, who took that band from fifteen hundred miles north of Brisbane through to Sydney, where he won the A Grade in that State, then over to New Zealand to win the aggregate there. It is scarcely conceivable that an amateur band could travel all that distance to a contest, yet this was done, and this band is a regular attender at all contests. Then we have Digger Walmsley, of the Manly Concert Band—probably the youngest conductor in Australia, and a pupil of Mr. Davis. Messrs. G. Simpson, Billy Smith, J. W. Gummow, Norm. Henstridge, Bill Ryder, Junior (a chip of the old block), Len Crew, that great trombonist, and a host of others, making up as fine a team of band trainers and conductors as it is possible to get in the world, all keen on their job and anxious to give bands and band music a help along the road of progress.

With the advent of contesting in Queensland many bands have whole-time conductors who are professional men and spend their whole time in connection with their band; but there are also many conductors who give their services just for the love of the game. Mr. A. W. Trembath, of Townsville, is one of these, and he has earned the esteem of everyone in the band game by his enthusiastic fathering of the Townsville Railway Band, carrying out his job of conductor, manager and organiser, etc., in a purely honorary capacity.

These men, together with their teams of amateur bandsmen, make up the glorious whole of the bandsmen of this State—all striving their utmost to give to others their talents, that the world might be made better for their playing—all the time doing their bit to place music on a higher plane, and providing recreation and enjoyment to their huge audiences of listeners.

The government of the Queensland Band Association has throughout the many years of its existence been in the capable hands of its officers. Prominent among the early officers may be mentioned Messrs. A. Andrews, followed by Messrs. Cook and Nicol (Hon. Secretaries); Messrs. C. Spargo, followed by Messrs. Dunstan and Ryan (Presidents); and Messrs. Will Jones, E. Jackson, H. Daniel, Len Seales, W. Burgemeister, George Cousins, Tom Beatson and others who have carried out their duties as executive officers. The office of President from 1928 to 1937 was carried out by Mr. W. H. Caught, and this official gave practically the whole of his time to the work of advancing the interests of the Association. Mr. Caught was a most capable officer and indefatigable worker for the cause, who knew his rules and governed the Association with a firm hand. He has recently been succeeded by Mr. C. H. Green as President, who is a competent business man and is an old bandsman of wide experience. The present Secretary, Mr. J. R. Foster, was appointed in 1926 and has held his responsible office since. He bids fair to become a permanent institution and the Association is content that it should be so.

With such capable officers it is small wonder that for 1937 a world record contest was staged in Brisbane, with prize money totalling the huge amount of £1670, and the contest proved, as all Queensland Contests do, a musical and financial success.

Banding in Queensland is now so firmly established that it has become a permanent institution, with nearly one hundred bands throughout the State and possessing collectively over $\pounds 60,000$ worth of instruments. The movement plays an important part in the national life of the community.

QUEENSLAND'S FIRST BAND CONTEST.

Delving into old records, the Executive of the Queensland Band Association were lucky enough to unearth a newspaper account of the very first Queensland Band Contest, which was held in the Botanic Gardens, Brisbane, in 1877, and was won by default by the old Gympie Odd-fellows' Band.

fellows' Band. Many interesting facts were brought to light in 1923 by Mr. Charles Dudley, who was induced to pen a record of Brisbane's first contest. Mr. Dudley, who was deputy bandmaster, stated: "Just 52 years ago (this was written in 1923) the M.U.I.O.O.F. and G.U.I.O.O.F. Lodges of Gympie decided to have a band, to be confined to its own members, and a little later this was carried into effect. Bands in those days were really very poor, judging them from a musical standard, their programmes consisting of marches, quadrilles, etc. For a time we were no exception to the rule, but in '75 there came to Gympie from England, a man with some repute as a player and conductor—the late John Snell. I may mention that I have often seen him play a stiff hornpipe for 20 minutes without a wipe. Cornetists will know what a task that is. task that is.

task that is. We soon noted his ability, and secured his services as a conductor. About his first act was to consign our music to the rubbish heap, and he soon had us at work on 'Rigoletto,' 'Grand Duchess,' 'La Fille de Madam Angot,' 'Ernani,' and many other operatic selections. In 1877 the first band contest in Queensland was announced to take place in Brisbane in the Gardens, in August, and we decided to enter. When one thinks of those far back davs, and the difficulties of getting a band to Brisbane with no railway, it speaks much for the enthusiasm of its members, but friends came to our assistance with horses and vehicles and, after a few breakdowns, we were enabled to reach Tewantin, where we spent the night, which was the night of Scott's fire in Gympie, with its frightful explosion of dynamite, the force of which might be gauged from the fact that next morning bars of soap, tins of jam and axes were found on the neighbouring high hills. Fortunately only one person was killed (John Stuckey). I have referred to this as it is one of the happenings that all old Gympieites will never forget. never forget.

We reached Brisbane (per Culgoa) early on a Sunday morning, being met by the Com-mittee, who billeted us at the old Union Hotel. After a 'fresh up' we went in to breakfast, when the Committee requested us to play a tune first, which we acceded to. So the music was placed on top of the crockery and we gave them the 'Hallelujah Chorus,'' which, I venture to say, would be the first time it was played in Brisbane by a band.

As there were several days before the contest we played at several functions, one being in aid of a children's hospital.


Then came the night of the contest, when a very big audience was present. Several Brisbane bands had entered, but they all 'funked' and did not play, but left us to play and win by default. It was not a matter of great surprise that they refused to play, seeing that their own choice contest pieces were marches, schottisches, etc., while we were 'billed' to play the 'Gloria' and 'Don Juan,' which had something of a classical ring about them. Probably most bands would withdraw under similar circumstances.

Thus ended the first Queensland Band Contest, but the band that won kept in existence for 30 years after, only under another name, and for a number of years scooped the pool at contests in many of our towns.

One peculiar feature was that we were a band of miners, for all followed mining pursuits with one exception, that one exception being myself. A further peculiarity was that, although the membership was open to both lodges of Oddfellows, 15 out of the 16 that visited Brisbane in '77 were Manchester Unity men.

In the days gone by Gympie has produced some fine instrumentalists, of which Clark, Dean, Gayton and Perkins will be best remembered It is needless to for me to say that there are very few alive to-day who played at the first contest held in Brisbane, but my mind often wanders back to the very many pleasant sociable evenings we had with our officials and friends so many years ago, when discord and friction were unknown."

Mr. Short, who is another of the few members left of the Gympie Oddfellows Band who were successful in 1877, is still living in Brisbane. Other members included Messrs. Alfred and Walter Ambrose, Joseph Ostwald and William Olds. Mr. Short remembers that when his band led the procession across the bridge at Brisbane in 1877 it was in connection with the celebrating of the fact that the tolls were abolished.

The years 1878, 1879 and 1880 are worthy of record in regard to Band contesting in New Zealand.

It was during this period that the first Contests were held, and the honour of pioneering the movement belongs to the late Captain W. J. Heywood, of Invercargill; the late Hon. George Jones, M.L.C., of Oamaru, and the late J. Fraser, of Queenstown.

The Oamaru Garrison Band and Invercargill Garrison Band held musical duels, and paved the way for larger Contests, which have been held at regular intervals ever since.

The International Exhibition, held in Hagley Park, Christchurch, in 1882, introduced the first brass band contest held in New Zealand. There were five competitors, and the band of the C. Battery of Artillery, Timaru (now the Municipal Band), were the winners. Rules governing the contest were somewhat elastic, there being no restriction as to number of players, the Timaru Band putting on seventeen performers, whilst the Band of the C.Y.C., Christchurch, had over thirty. Bass and side drums were allowed, and there was no question as to the bona fide of any player in regard to his active association with a band for any stated period. Mr. Jas. Rowles was the conductor, and Mr. T. Perry solo cornet. The test selection was "Own Choice," and Timaru's choice was "Notre Chere Alsace," a piece which became very popular. After the judge's decision was announced, there was a call for more music from the winning band, and Timaru responded with a selection from "Fatience." It happened that at this time Williamson's Company was singing the opera in New Zealand, and the band was served, with a writ, prohibiting it from again playing "Patience."

It was, however, left to Oamaru to actually start Contesting on something approaching sound and satisfactory lines. This Contest was held in Oamaru on Saturday, 26th April, 1886 The date is worthy of note, as it was the first Contest at which a Test Selection was supplied. The name of the Selection was "Wagner," arranged by H. Round. The Musical Adjudicator was Herr Beno Scherick.

The next Band Contest was held in Christchurch in November, 1889. the Test Selection "Beethoven." The winner was the Oamaru Garrison Band, with Christchurch Garrison "Beethoven." being second.

The formation of the first New Zealand Brass Bands' Association dates from this Con-test. Rules and regulations were submitted at a meeting held on the 11th November, 1889, and were subsequently approved at a representative meeting held at Oamaru the following Easter.

The first Contest held under the jurisdiction of the Association took place at Dunedin in 1890, the Musical Judge being the late Mr. T. Tallis Trimmell, Mus. Bac., of Wellington, who did not award points-just placed the Bands in order of merit.

The next Contest was held in Wellington, when Mr. T. Tallis Trimmell again acted as Adjudicator, and introduced a system of awarding points, which has ruled ever since.

During these early years the honours were held by Bands from the South Island, but the end came at Timaru, in 1895, when the Wellington Garrison Band, under the conductorship of Mr. T. Herd, now Captain T. Herd, V.D., won the Championship. The two Selections were "Der Freischutz" and "Halevy." At this Contest the Wellington Garrison Band played two men short, and won from eleven South Island Bands. From that time onwards the North Island Bands have won their fair share of the Championship Honours.

For a period of years following, Contests were conducted by two separate organisations-viz., North Island Brass Bands' Association and the South Island Brass Bands' Association, sometimes in harmony, but unfortunately at times in conflict. It is, however, pleasing to relate that the two Associations came together in 1931, and merged into the present New Zealand Brass Bands' Association, with which to-day is affiliated no less than 98 Brass Bands.

BANDS IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The South Australian Band Association was inaugurated at the late Mr. R. Correll's Music Store, Flinders Street, Adelaide, on March 21st, 1903. At a massed band concert held in the Adelaide Town Hall the following resolution was

unanimously carried :----

unanimously carried:—
"That this meeting is of the opinion that a Band Association similar to those in existence in Victoria and New South Wales should be formed in South Australia, and that steps be immediately taken to form such an Association in South Australia." Messrs. R. Correll and G. Wedd were requested to act as joint secretaries to the movement, and to draft and issue circulars to bands who might be willing to co-operate, asking them to send delegates to a meeting to be held at the same place on the night of March 28th, 1903. Circulars were issued by the joint secretaries as requested, and the first meeting was held on March 28th, when the Band Association of South Australia was inaugurated. Minutes of meeting held at Correll's Music Store, Flinders Street, Adelaide, on March 28th, 1903, at 8 p.m. for the purpose of forming a South Australian Band Association:— Present: Messrs. Jno. Luxton (Port Adelaide City Band), P. E. Copp and E. A.

Present: Messrs. Jno. Luxton (Port Adelaide City Band), F. E. Copp and E. A. Errington (Central Mission), J. H. Usher (Adelaide Temperance), R. H. Smith (Port Adelaide Temperance), G. Wedd and R. Correll. Mr. R. Correll was elected to the chair.

A circular which had been issued by the joint secretaries at the instance of a previous meeting held on March 21st, requesting bands to send delegates to the present meeting, was read to the delegates present. The chairman explained the object of the meeting, and letters promising support were received from a number of country bands and read to the meeting. The Secretary, pro tem, read the Constitution of the Victorian Band Association for the

information of those present, also letters from the Secretary of the V.B.A. promising support. Mr. J. Luxton moved that an Association be formed to be called "The Band Association of South Australia." Mr. Usher seconded.—Carried unanimously. Mr. Copp proposed that the rules of the V.B.A. be adopted subject to any necessary alterations. Mr. Luxton seconded.—Carried.


Mr. Errington proposed that the Secretary write to the V.B.A. informing that that an Association had been formed in S.A. and asking for affiliation with the V.B.A. that body Mr. Usher seconded.-Carried.

Mr. Errington proposed that the meeting stand adjourned to Saturday, April 4th, 1903, at the same time and place, and that the Secretary be instructed to write to the various bands in the State notifying them of the date of the adjourned meeting and requesting them to send two delegates to that meeting with power to act for their band, the principal business to be brought forward being the election of officers.
