


During the championships I hope to be able to hear some of the music that you will be playing. May I wish all of you a pleasant stay in Hobart.

# MUSICAL ADJUDICATOR AUSTRALIAN BRASS BAND CHAMPIONSHIPS 1974 MAJOR ALEX H. HENDERSON, AASM, BASM, ARCM, CANBERRA DIRECTOR OF MUSIC FOR THE AUSTRALIAN ARMY



Major Alex H. Henderson has been involved in Brass and Military Band for 36 years, as a cornet and trombone player and later conductor and adjudicator in leading Bands throughout Australia.

A graduate of the Australian Army School of Music at Balcombe and the British Army School of Music at Kneller Hall, he is an Associate of the Royal College of Music.

Major Henderson was senior instructor at The Australian Army School of Music for sometime and Director of the Eastern Command Band in Sydney before taking up his present appointment in 1970.

For the 1973 Sydney Brass performance at the Sydney Symphony Orchestra's Promenade Concerts, the Band was prepared by Major Henderson, and two radio broadcasts for future reply were also recorded by the ABC. Included in the programme were compositions and arrangements by Mr. Henderson.

Major Henderson is a member of the Canberra City Choir and appears regularly with this group in conjunction with the Canberra City Orchestra.

# MUSICAL ADJUDICATOR MR. D. CUSHION, HOBART

Registered Music Adjudicator and Member of the Musical Advisory Board of Tasmanian Bands League.

He has been principal trumpet player in the Tasmanian Symphonie Orchestra for 21 years and at the time of appointment was the youngest trumpet player ever appointed to such a position, he also played on loan to the W.A. Symphonie Orchestra.

Currently teaching Brass at the Tasmanian University.

At the age of 7 he studied under "Hughie" Niven with Brunswick City Band (Vic), was Solo Cornet at the age of 16 and Dep. Bandmaster at 18 years.



His playing covers Ballet, Opera, Symphonic, Dance and Brass Bands.

He is a member of the well known Tasmanian Trumpet Trio.

Appointed Music Adjudicator at T.B.L. Championships in 1964, 1965, 1967, 1969 and with the N.S.W. Band Association in 1968.

### SPECIAL NOTICE TO COMPETING BANDS.

- 1. Secretaries and Conductors of Bands MUST OBSERVE PERFECT PUNCTUALITY in assembling at the time and places appointed and in placing their Bands upon the platform (or the green, as the case may be) for the Contests.
- 2. Each Band in its numerical order, must be ready to march on to the platform (or the green, as the case may be) before the preceding one has left the platform (or green).
- 3. A Band not ready to proceed with the Contest as directed by the Managers, is liable to a fine or disqualification. The General Manager (or the Sub-Manager of any particular session) will have sole control of the Contest, and all his directions must be carefully and promptly complied with.
- 4. Music stands have been provided gy the Hobart City Band which must be used by all competing Bands.
- 5. Any protest against a Band, Party, or Soloist, must be lodged with the Contest Secretary not later than 15 mins. after the decision of the Adjudicator has been announced and the protest fees prescribed must be paid at the same time. Protest fees payable by a party lodging a protest shall be: For a protest lodged against a Band, \$4.20; against a Party or Soloist \$1.05.
- 6. Times indicated in the Programme are recommended times for Band to be in attendance. Starting times for each event will be as near as possible to these times.

  1st Band is expected to be on Stage five(5) minutes before starting time.
- 7. Order of playing throughout is according to the draw conducted by the Tasmanian Bands League.

# MR. DOUG BRADSHAW DEVONPORT, TASMANIA.

Mr. Doug Bradshaw began his musical career in 1931 with the RANR where he played for 8 years as an instrumentalist.

In 1940 he enlisted with the RAAF and later took the opportunity to play in the Band.

He has played with various Bands in Victoria, NSW, Queensland before settling down in Tasmania where he was a member of the Latrobe Federal Band for 11 years. During this time he led LFB to victory in the Quickstep, in 8 consecutive years in his capacity as Drum Major.

He has won the 'BILL WELLING MEMORIAL SHIELD' for the best Tasmanian Drum Major on 3 occasions.


In 1964 he became a Drill Adjudicator and in 1965 he was judged Champion Drum Major during the VBL Championships for C, D Grade Quickstep and Streetmarch in Ballarat.

He has judged the TBL Championships on 6 occasions and was the Drill Adjudicator for the 1969 Australian Championships in Launceston, Tasmania.

# MR. ALLAN TUCKER LAUNCESTON, TASMANIA.

Mr. Allan Tucker has had a very long association with banding in Tasmania. He joined the Launceston Railway Silver Band in 1938 and with continued service has been a player, Drum Major, Committeeman and is at present Chairman of the Committee and a Life member.


In his capacity as Drum Major he has led the Band to numerous successes and during one period coached the Launceston Boys and Citizen Band to five successive victories. He has adjudicated

He saw service with the RAAF during World War II and at present holds the rank of Flight Lieutenant in the Air Training Corps and is responsible for the organisation and training programme of promotion courses run by the Tasmanian Squadron.

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# TASMANIA'S LEADING BUILDERS

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### BRIEF HISTORY OF SOME COMPETING BANDS

CROYDON CITIZENS' BAND: (VIC). The Band was formed in 1962 with the majority of players, instruments and music coming from two other Bands in the district which had ceased operation. In 1963, Mr. Ralph Williamson became the first officially appointed Bandmaster, and under his guidance, the Band developed to the stage of commencing contesting in 1965 with attendance at the Victorian Band League and Traralgon Eisteddfod contests. Mr. Ralph Williamson was forced to retire in 1969 due to ill health and was succeeded by Mr. Eric Page R.M.S.M. (Kneller Hall). We consider ourselves lucky to have had the services of these two Bandmasters. Both have been driving forces in the Band and have taken a keen interest in the training of learners. The Band has contested every year since 1965 and began competing at the South Street competitions in 1970. It has now competed at 27 contests, all in 'D' Grade, and has gained 1st place on 4 occasions but has only succeeded in gaining 2nd place on two occasions at the South St. competitions. The Band was upgraded to 'C' Grade late in 1973. The present office bearers are:

President—P. Baker, Bandmaster—E. Page, and I. Morison as Drum Major.

WILLOUGHBY MUNICIPAL BAND: (NSW). This young (in age) band from Sydney with a good future was established in 1961 as the Chatswood District Band under the baton of Mr. Reg. Bishop. In 1964 it changed to its present name of Willoughby Municipal. Two years later in 1966 they won the Australian 'D' Grade Championships at Dubbo, NSW, and in 1967 won the State 'C' Grade. They have been runners up in the 'B' Grade on three occasions in 1968, 1969 and 1972. In 1970 Mr. P. Walmsley became the Musical Director and under his baton the Band have had many successes winning the 1972 Queensland 'B' Grade Championships. The Senior Band is made up of a large number of players who have come up through the Junior ranks. The Junior Band as competed over the years with successes in most contests their best year being 1972.

TOOWOOMBA MUNICIPAL BAND: (QLD). The Band has been in existence well before the turn of the century and has been active ever since its formation. It first entered A Grade competition in 1948 after winning the Queensland B Grade championship in 1947. Since then it has competed consistently in A Grade competition at both State and National levels. In 1970 the Band was narrowly defeated for the National Championship in Sydney. Some of the present players have been active members for well over twenty five years. Championship Solo's have been won by present Bandsmen P. Davies, K. Bowtell, R. Mooney, J. Muller and the present Bandmaster Mr. W. R. Smith who has held this position for twenty two years. The Secretary at present is Mr. Kenneth A. Rub.

NEWCASTLE & DISTRICT POLICE CITIZENS BOYS' CLUB: (NSW). The Band was formed by Mr. Frank Simm and after a lot of hard work entered the contest field for the first time in 1966 to compete in the N.S.W. State contest and won the 'D' Grade as well as the Street March with champion Drum Major W. Bell. Since then the Band hasn't looked back. In 1967 they organised and won the N.S.W. Junior Band Championships and 1968 saw them winning all sections in the Aust. Junior Band Championships. After a loss of 14 players due to them turning 18, they bounced right back and in 1972 again won the Aust. Junior Band Championships and came second in 'C' Grade. The Band has excellent leadership in Bandmaster Mr. Frank Simm, so much so that one of their past Solo Cornet players is at present with the Grenadier Guards.

The President of this keen group of Bandsmen is Mr. Jack Mitchell, with Mrs. Dora Simm as Secretary. The man 'out front' is Drum Major Greg Lawson who has won the N.S.W. Drum Major title and all local titles. The Band is competing in two grades Junior and 'C' Grade.

ST. ARNAUD CITIZEN BAND: (VIC.) The first Band was established in 1875 and through the years to 1897 three other Bands were formed in the district, the Lord Nelson Band, the Hellings Model Band and the Reids Band. Around 1903 the remnants of the Lord Nelson and Reids Bands were amalgamated to form the St. Arnaud and District Band. This Band progressed under the baton of several Bandmasters until 1943 when a new committee backed by a strong ladies' auxillary raised a sum of money large enough to reequip the Band with new uniforms, instruments and a new bandhall. The Band was then renamed to its present name. The success of the Band is in no small way due to the musical ability of Bandmaster Bill Youngston, who encourages and teaches the Junior members of the Band. So much so that Junior Bandsmen gain outstanding results at music schools held at Nhill, Charlton and Stawell. In August '72 they became the Victorian 'D' Grade Champions in the Coburg City Hall and since their recent win at Royal South Street in October '73 have been upgraded to 'C' Grade. The present executive Committee is as follows; President: Harold Rice. Secretary: Frank Scilini. Treasurer: Rup. Halfhide. Bandmaster: Bill Youngston. Drum Major: Norm Battersby.

MARYBOROUGH CITIZENS BRASS BAND: (VIC.) The Band was formed in 1898, made up of several Bands around the nearby district, and has always been a very competitive Band as far back as 1905. During the period 1920 - 22 the band took part in 10 contests all over Victoria and won all events under the baton of the late Frank ('Massa') Johnston with Arthur ('Paddy') Harris Bandmaster. The nephew of 'Paddy' is the present Bandmaster Arthur John Harris and has been for the last 29 years. The Band has the reputation of being the most travelled band in Victoria, having competed in all states except W.A. with many successes. One of the original bandsmen, the late Albert Curtis was presented by H.M. the Queen with the B.E.M. for 72 years of outstanding service. The president of this fine 'B' Grade Band at present is Mr. James Griffin who originally came from Queenstown, Tas., with secretary Mr. Norman H. Ford and drum major Len Floyd.





New Town High School opened as the Hobart Junior Technical School in Bathurst Street in 1919. It became apparent as the years rolled by, particular after 1940, that the existing buildings in Bathurst Street were inadequate to meet increasing numbers. The Government therefore bought 14 acres known as the Mawbey's Estate, as the site for the new Hobart Technical High School. From 1951 to the present

day the school has continued to expand to cope with higher enrolments. Until 1962 the school enjoyed a selective entry, but with the establishment of districts for all High Schools at the end of 1961, the school became comprehensive in its intake and its name was changed to New Town High School. The school has a magnificent assembly hall, a gymnasium, a cement basketball court, three all-weather tennis courts, a good football oval, a hockey practice ground, a sports pavillion and excellent classrooms, of which the Technical Departments, Music, Arts and Science Blocks are features. The school has built up in its 54 years of existence an enviable record in academic, musical and sporting spheres.



### LITTERBUGS: STIFF FINES.

Those who drop litter illegally in Hobart face stiff penalties. Under the Litter Act 1973, the maximum fine for the general casting of litter is \$500.-.

The same Act now prescribes a penalty of \$160.00 on those who drop any type of rubbish in or on any area owned by the Hobart City Council, except where the Council or its officers or servants direct, and penalties of \$250.00 for breaches of that Act, such as not giving proper names and not removing litter when requested.

This year the March played by Junior Bands on stage must be composed by Alex LITHGOW

Alex Lithgow, born in Glasgow on Dec. 1 1870 was Launceston's "Mozart" from 1894 to 1929 when he died.

It was to Invercargill, on the southern tip of New Zealand — "the end of the world" as he described it — that Alex Lithgow came as a boy with his musical family.

For the next 50 years his genius blazed, as instrumentalist, conductor and composer. Without formal musical training, he played cornet at nine. By 20 he was Bandmaster of the Invercargill Garrison Band, and was its star cornet soloist.

In 1894 the St. Joseph's Band in Launceston, Tas. invited Lithgow to become Bandmaster, and he accepted. Soon he was the darling of Musical Launceston. When he wrote a new number the whole town would soon be heard whistling and humming it. Cataract Gorge was the perfect amphitheatre where Lithgow first played and conducted his catchy compositions. Every week Launcestonians flocked to the Gorge and the City Park to hear his music. On wet days he drew full houses to the Albert Hall, which was the venue for the 1969 National Championships.


Programmes included overtures, suites and ensembles but most popular, even today, was the March "Invercargill".


Lithgow's jaunty, defiant numbers found immediate response in America, where they won pride of place in concerts conducted by America's maestro of Band Music, John Philip Sousa. In fact, Lithgow became known as "Sousa of the antipodes".

Crowding into his life the roles of familyman, printer, instrumentalist, bandmaster, conductor and composer hastened Lithgow's death at 59.

In 1929, at the funeral of this quiet, generous and undoubted genius, 200 Bandsmen marched from the City to Carr Villa cemetary in Launceston, playing his beloved "Invercargill" and "Queen of the North" in tribute.

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

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### A FEW NOTES ON THE COMPOSER OF "ORION"

Sir Granville BANTOCK.

Granville Bantock was born in London on Aug. 7 1868. He was educated for the Civil Service, but entered the Royal Academy of Music at the age of 21 and gained the MacFarren scholarship. In 1892 one of his first works, an opera called 'CAEDMAR', was performed at the Olympic Theatre, London.

In 1897 he became conductor at New Brighton, where he insisted on turning a military Band into an orchestra and on producing interesting programs of classical and modern music. He was the first conductor in England to perform the music of Sebelius.

In 1908 he succeeded Elgar as professor of Music at Birmingham University and he held this position until 1934 when he was succeeded by Victor Hely-Hutchinson.

In his youth he impressed the musical world of England by the gigantic plans of some of his works, even if they remained unrealised, like the symphonic-oratorio 'CHRISTUS' which was to be in ten vast sections.

He was knighted in 1930 and died in London on Oct. 16, 1946.




